At first the forces relied on volunteers, but with heavy loss of life compulsory enlistment or conscription was brought in by the Military Service Act of 1916.

Conscription lasted until mid-1919.

- Single men from 18 to 41 were first called up.
- In June 1916 married men.
- Later the call-up age was raised to 51.
- Widowers with children and ministers of religion were exempt.
- Military Service Tribunals heard claims for exemption on grounds of work of national importance, domestic hardship, health and conscientious objection.

The lists below show the variety of regiments and units the men joined, so their experience of war differed.

Below are **LISTS OF SERVICEMEN** from Crockenhill, Eynsford, Farningham and Lullingstone known to have served in the Armed Forces, but these are very unlikely to be complete. Also **LISTS OF VOTERS IN 1918 and 1919.**

CROCKENHILL with EYNSFORD = 2147 3544 acres 404 houses

Serving from Crockenhill = 206

Serving from Eynsford = 194

18% of total population of villages

(but much higher % of men between 18 and 51 years of age)

FARNINGHAM = 1286 2739 acres 242 houses

Serving from Farningham = 195

15% of total population

(but much higher % of men between 18 and 51 years of age)

LULLINGSTONE = 113 1557 acres 15 houses

Serving from Lullingstone = 16

14% of total population

(but much higher % of men between 18 and 51 years of age)

IMPACT OF CALL-UP

It is hard to imagine what the impact on individual lives and on the village communities when so many men left.

IMPACT ON THE VILLAGES

Families were parted from loved-ones, probably for the first time.

Many women were left to bring up families without their husbands.

Employers lost workers & labour had to be found among older men and women.

Parents missed sons.

IMPACT ON THE SERVICEMEN

It is very unlikely that labouring men had ever travelled abroad, or rarely been beyond London and the South East.

As most found employment in the villages in which they lived, and so were close to their families and friends, the wrench would have been even more difficult.

Yet many joined up in the spirit of adventure, duty and patriotism.

5th BATTALION ROYAL WEST KENT REGIMENT – SWANLEY DISTRICT

4 August 1914 - Mobilised.

Formed from Territorials, training on Salisbury Plain when war declared.

29 October 1914 - Embarked for India.

5 December 1914 - Arrived at Jhansi, India, being the most far-flung serving unit of local men.

Below are newspaper cuttings describing the early months at Jhansi.

They had little to do there, but prepare for the order to be sent to The Front, which never came.

January 1915 - A photograph shows the Swanley District men at Jhansi. Those underlined came from Crockenhill, Eynsford or Farningham.

After nearly 3 years in India they were drafted for active service in Mesopotamia.

5 December 1917 - Embarked for Mesopotamia.

27 December 1919 - Demobilised in Mosul (Iraq).

THEY WERE AMONG THE FIRST TO BE ENLISTED, BUT AMONG THE LAST TO BE SENT HOME, arriving in England on 22 January 1920

Two local men whose photographs come from the group photograph died far from home.





In Mesopotamia

The Battalion comprised 19 officers and 727 men. The weak and sickly were left behind.

From January to October 1918 the troops struggled up the Tigris towards Turkey.

They arrived just about when the Armistice was signed with Turkey on 31 October 1918.

There were 17 officers and 409 men left.

They spent a year in Mosul before being sent home.

22 January 1920 arrived in U.K.
