Thomas Wood & Sons were steam engine proprietors with a foundry & workshops on Cray Road – premises still owned by the Wood family, with some equipment still in situ that would have been running in the First World

CROCKENHILL Thomas Wood owned several farms – Woodlands (Knatts Valley), Greatness (Sevenoaks), Pedham Place (Farningham), West Farleigh (near the Medway) and Otford Castle Farm – supplied the Royal Navy with vegetables.

In the First World War the Company was contracted to plough up Sevenoaks Racecourse to turn into farmland.





Had War Office contract, which ended in July 1920, to haul guns from Woolwich to Chatham Dockyard.

Sidney Gilham was given exemption from military service because he was the only skilled engineer left in the firm.

Wood's last steam plough was bought in 1919 as John Fowler had to build a quota to help food production, and Thomas Wood was on the list to have one supplied.
