PRIVATE FRANK ROBERTS

Enlisted: In 1915 at Bromley aged 17 (said he was 18)

Served: Private G/3812,1st Battalion Queen's Royal West

Surrey Regiment

After 3 months he was sent to France, where he became a popular and promising soldier.

On 27 August 1915 he was relieved from trench duty on an extended Western Front. It was very hot, so went to bathe in a canal nearby, even though he could not swim. He and a friend dived in and got stuck in the mud at the bottom, and both were drowned.

Frank's parents got an official notice of death by accidental drowning, but another local man in the same regiment told them the details when he was on leave in Crockenhill. He was Herbert Randall.

<u>SERGEANT HERBERT ERNEST RANDALL D.C.M. – PROMOTION, AWARD OF</u>

D.C.M. (Distinguished Conduct Medal), DEATH

- In 1st Battalion Queen's Royal West Surrey Regiment, fought in Battles of Loos and Somme, before Frank Roberts joined the Regiment and was drowned.
- 29 September 1916, aged 17¾, made Lance Corporal.
- November 1916 had Trench Foot, probably when he had leave in Crockenhill and visited the Roberts' family.
- 23 December 1916, made Corporal.
- In Battle of Arras.
- 24 April 1917, promoted Sergeant in the field only 1 of 43 survivors of 1st Battalion.
- Awarded D.C.M. in Battle of Passchendaele,

September 1917. Found 3 men buried in debris - under heavy fire for over an hour, with 2 volunteers released & saved them.

• 21 September 1918 fighting near Villiers at the Battle of Cambrai, aged 20, he was one of 323 casualties.

Buried in Meath Cemetery, in the middle of the former battlefield.
