REPORTS FROM COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN'S REPORT (Barbara Cannell 864253)

As I have nothing of importance to report on publications in this Bulletin I have decided to give a report on our recent Annual General Meeting.

This was held at Farningham Village Hall and attended by about 24 members. It would have been nice to see a few more of you. Sadly despite all our efforts membership is falling and volunteers to join the committee are non-existent. We now have only seven committee members including myself as Chairman, a treasurer, an archivist and an editor for the bulletin. We desperately need a secretary or at least a

minute secretary, someone who would be willing to arrange speakers for three evening meetings a year and the AGM. Also needed is someone to take control of the memberships, keeping the list up to date and processing payments and new members. It would also be an added bonus if we could have a list of non-committee members who we could call upon to assist us with events such as the Farningham Church Fete (which has now been postponed to the 8th September due to the bad weather) and the occasional requests to take a display to other local societies. I would like to thank the two ladies who have offered to give assistance, one at the AGM (I would be most grateful if this lady could call me with her contact details) and one at the open day at the Olive Seal Hall. The more members we have the more we can do to entertain not only our society members but the local residents.

Whilst talking with Susan Pittman recently about a communication I had received from the Kent Archaeology Society we realised that perhaps members might not be aware of the opportunities available to attend meeting held by other societies.

Monty Parkin

I received the very sad news this week about the death of Monty Parkin, a writer and speaker of such delights as On East Hill (Memories of life on the North Downs by Jack Hollands) and more recently, Surviving by Magic the remarkable story of Fergus Anckorn, magician and survivor of the Thai-Burma death Railway. I am sure some of you will remember Monty, he came to Eynsford and presented The Seal Chart Murder, 1908 in which he tried to unravel the death of Mrs Caroline Luard and more recently his talk, Art is Long, discovering the sometimes scandalous but fascinating lives of well- known people from the inscriptions on their tomb stones.

Monty Parkin will be remembered not only as a writer and speaker but also as an accomplished artist. A gentleman of outstanding talent who will be greatly missed, who would willingly stop and talk no matter where we met, and who, through his books recording the lives of country people and his delightful paintings of villages and landscapes, left for us to enjoy, a history of a corner of Kent that he loved.

RESEARCH REPORT (Susan Pittman 669923) website www.felhs.org.uk

The New 'Kent History and Library Centre'

The opening of the new Centre was planned for 23 April, and I have been invited. I will report back in the next Bulletin. The new Centre is about a five minutes' walk away from the old Centre, so is still very convenient for Maidstone East station.

Scrapbooks in the Kent Archaeological Society Library, Maidstone Museum

While the old Centre for Kentish Studies was closed I decided to browse in the above Library and came across some huge leather bound scrapbooks, with some interesting items for Eynsford, Farningham and Lullingstone. As most items in this report seem to feature Eynsford I thought I would tell you about the Farningham items here, and save the Eynsford items for the next Bulletin.

- An original list of subscribers for raising the church tower c.1820s. There were 31 names on the list, headed by the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Bishop of Durham, who both donated £20 (double the higher of the other donations). 13 vicars and rectors contributed. James Colyer, Miss Colyer, W. Jessup and F. Burnside were the only Farningham residents. Three members of the Dyke family of Lullingstone were benefactors. The list ended with a sketch of the church as it was with lower tower, and another of how it would look with the tower raised.
- Building plans and exterior sketch of the new farmhouse at Chimhams, designed by St. Pierre Harris in 1886.
- 'Hovels at Farningham Not Fit for Human Habitations', undated press cutting about Nightingale Place, Button Street, condemned by the rural sanitary authority of Dartford. 'The tenants are a decent, uncomplaining lot', but the cottages 'are dreadfully unhealthy'. One man's child had died, and the woman next door had also lost a child through 'round worm', and her husband had been suffering for seven months from fever and ague. The well had not been cleaned out for more than three years, and sewage was percolating into it.
- Headed notepaper from Lion Hotel, 19 September, 1880, with block print of the hotel. Written by T.E. Dunn proprietor 'We will keep Bed and Sitting Rooms as requested and send Fly to meet 11.27 at Eynsford tomorrow Saturday.'

Obit and Lamp rents, Lullingstone

Sir John Peche paid £500 to the wardens of the Grocers Company, London, for them to arrange prayers for his soul, and to distribute 8 pence weekly to the poor men of the parish, and to pray for the Bishop of Rochester in January and to distribute £1 to the poor afterwards.

(TNA E303/184, Augmentation Office, 20 June 1533 in KAS Kent Records, 1936) pp.75-76

Francis Booker, a C18th cricketer, from 'Soho Inn', Eynsford

It is always pleasing to receive a response to the queries I pose in the Bulletin from time to time. David tells me that the present 'Ford House', previously Eynsford Post Office, is reputed to have been the 'Soho Inn'. David has not seen documentary evidence to support the claim, but believes there are definite signs that Ford House

was once an inn. The word 'soho' dates from 1307, and was the call used by huntsmen to direct the attention of dogs or other hunters to their quarry.

Henry Cox Eleemonsynary Charity, Eynsford

Henry Cox, an Eynsford butcher, who lived at Charton Manor, Farningham, in the 1800s, set up a charity in 1850 whereby Pollyhaugh field was settled in trust and its rent paid to the Minister of Eynsford to provide blankets at Christmas for poor elderly women in Eynsford. The original trustees were the owner of Charton Manor, the owner of Lullingstone Castle, the owner of Eynsford Mill and the Minister of Farningham. In 1955 the Charity Commissioners ordered Pollyhaugh field to be sold and the money raised was invested in the name of the Official Trustees of Charitable Funds. Unfortunately, since then the revised constitution of the charity has been lost, the Charity Commission, thinking the Charity had ceased, destroying its records. FELHS has been asked whether it can supply any information, but has been unable to, except using Hilary and Wilfrid Harding's FELHS publication 'The Charities of Farningham and Eynsford' from which pages 12-16 have been used above.

Eynsford Station, 150 years old

The Sevenoaks, Maidstone and Tunbridge railway opened Eynesford (how it was then spelt) station on 1 July 1862. The company was absorbed into the London, Chatham and Dover Railway Company in 1879. The line was electrified in 1935. The original footbridge over the rails was a lattice structure, later replaced by the concrete footbridge due to be replaced this year. Originally there were two sidings and a turntable, but another siding was added in 1904 (see below). The goods yard closed in 1962. When under the control of the South Eastern and Chatham Railways, there was a strike in 1919, which was most effective on 27 September when only 17 passenger and one goods train ran (as the strike weakened there were 307 trains with 101 locos running). There were various acts of sabotage during the strike, including the cutting of signal wires at Eynsford.

More about tennis and Sir William Hart Dyke

In the KAS scrapbooks mentioned above there was a newspaper cutting from *The Daily Express*, 12 August 1929, in which an interview with Sir William Hart Dyke about his involvement in the early game of lawn tennis was related. In the interview Sir William, then aged 93, claimed to have drawn up the draft rules with Julian Marshall and J.M. Heathcote in 1873. The formal rules were written down in 1875 by an MCC committee of 5, which included Mr Heathcote and Sir William. Lady Emily Hart Dyke, during the interview, looked at a picture of crinolined ladies playing tennis and said that that was how she used to play. 'I was one of the first girl players. I played with my sister in the garden of my father (the 7th Earl of Sandwich) at Huntingdon... We used to tuck up our skirts.'

The Village of Eynsford by H.H.B. c.1909

I notice that this was priced at £60 recently, so if you have a copy be aware of its value.

1920s/1930s Eynsford Memories by Geoffrey Arthur Meakin of Willow Cottage (1915-2006)

Geoffrey was born at Willow Cottage and lived there with his brother, James, and their parents, Frederick Meakin, an architect and surveyor with an office in London, and Jean (formerly Southern). The Meakins bought Willow Cottage in 1913, but during the First World War it was rented to Lady Mary Thyne, associated with the Hart Dykes, and sometime later to the artist, Graham Sutherland. The Meakins lived

in Willow Cottage until about 1931. Geoffrey mentioned several colourful village characters including prominent figures as well as the postman, milkman, policeman and road sweeper. (See below for Geoffrey Meakin's recollections of Mr Hynard)

Local railway sidings

The SECR was the largest carrier of manure in the country, transporting it from London into Kent. In Swanley manure was still unloaded close to the station in 1903, which caused annoyance to the residents and to the nearby Kent Jam Factory. In March 1904 SECR bought land at Bournewood Crossing to the west of Swanley and by 1911 the siding was being used for general refuse traffic and a tramway was even considered for it by the contractor working there. In 1904 a new manure siding was provided at Eynsford.

(South Eastern and Chatham Railways by Adrian Grey (Middleton Press, 1998) p.123.)

Geoffrey Meakin remembered the Eynsford siding, locally known as 'Hynard's Dump'. The manure was fermented and composted down, with the aid of chemicals and water, to be spread over the vegetable fields. 'The villagers were tolerant – because this business of Mr Hynard's was most profitable and he was quite liberal with his cheque book when approached by the vicar, for instance, or the Village Hall Committee when they wanted a new roof, or the Pageant Committee when they required a maypole or such other things. He contributed very generously to repairs to the bridge and certain renovations to the much-love Tudor House – Oh and a new pavilion for the Cricket Club. After all, what was the suffering of a few noxious smells wafting over the village in high summer against all these pecuniary benefits bestowed very quietly, but most effectively on the community as a whole? Silence was the only price and for the most part it was willingly paid.'

Glass bottle found in the riverbed at Common Meadow

Veronica Sheppard and I are going through the artefacts and came across this bottle, which had been dug up from the riverbed undamaged. It was of a mineral bottle from D.T.J. Lyle and Son. It probably dates from the 1920s. Daniel Thomas Lyle was born in Cardiff in 1852 and died in 1924. His business was at 91 King Street, Maidstone in the 1910s. The business, then D.T.J. Lyle and Sons, ended very recently, in September 2011.

Family history enquiries

Booker of Eynsford – Margaret was trying to trace the family line of Francis Booker m. Sarah Boniface in Worthing, but although I put her in touch with others tracing the Booker family tree in Eynsford, the query was not sorted out.

Freda Pedder – Freda was the Eynsford inhabitant who married one of the Cossack troupe. Her second cousin, Richard, found a reference to Freda in our Bulletin in a Google search, and wanted to be put in contact with Julia, Freda's niece, who had previously contacted the Society. The two are now in touch with each other.

Herbert Roberts, blacksmith of Eynsford, 1890s to 1911 - As Herbert's family lived in Gibson's cottages in the 1901 census I suggested Caroline purchase Wilf Duncombe's publication 'The Gibson Family of Eynsford and Farningham', and also sent her a copy of a picture of the village forge, in case her ancestor worked there. Smith family of Eynsford – Christine was enquiring about Thomas Smith (1731-

Smith family of Eynsford – Christine was enquiring about Thomas Smith (1731-1798) born Shoreham m. Dorcas Stone. Other surnames were Wood, Dartnell, Perkins, Pryer. Unfortunately, although there is plenty known of the Smith family of Crockenhill, I was unable to make any connection, and was unable to help.

Spice of Crockenhill – I forwarded Fran's queries to Roger who has researched the Spice family and was able to link his and Fran's branches.

Henry Cox Eleemosynary Charity – information sought, see above

Farningham Home Guard – Janet wanted information about the Wright brothers of Farningham in the Second World War.

Institute Cottage, Eynsford – Rod was interested as a prospective buyer of the property.

Cherry Cottage, Farningham – Richard was interested as a prospective buyer of the property.

Farningham Hobby Horse photos – Franny offered a digital photographic record of these, which I accepted, but have not yet received. I did go to see the Hobby Horse exhibition at Sevenoaks, and thought the beasts very ingenious and beautifully made.
