News from FELHS AGM

We were pleased to welcome our new President, Philip McGarvey, to the AGM. He also acted as Chairman in the absence of Veronica Sheppard.



Philip is well known locally because he has been active in the area for many years, serving on Farningham Parish Council for 24 years and Sevenoaks District Council for 20 years.

He became one of the first members of FELHS (created just 4 years after he moved to Farningham in 1981). He was its Treasurer for 13 years, and was deeply involved when the Society became a registered charity and then a Charitable Company Limited by Guarantee for the purposes of being lawfully able to sign the lease for the

current archive centre. Computerising the accounts in Excel was his early priority.

He has manned the entrance of Lullingstone Castle for 11 years and been a part-time guide there. He has written a guide for the guides round the Castle, which is in draft form at present. Added to all this he has updated the Walker's guide to Farningham, and produced a walkabout leaflet for Farningham Church and is planning one for Eynsford church. A complex project has been mapping the monuments in both churchyards.

These are only some of his local involvements. He says that if you add all these up with his 27 years in international banking and 11 years as a church administrator, that makes him about 142, although he only looks half that age!

The Committee was re-elected with the exception of John Mullen, who remains FELHS Company Secretary, without being on the Committee. 

Anthony Roper Primary School: a history by Diana Beamish

This publication was perfectly timed to coincide with the Golden Jubilee of the opening of Anthony Roper School in 1973, and the 200th anniversary of the opening of the first village school in Farningham run by The National Society, an Anglican body, in 1823. Eynsford had a 'Church' School from 1837 and a school for Non-Conformist scholars, run by The British and Foreign Society, from 1844. In 1894 Eynsford opened a Board School, followed by Farningham in 1902 - these were effectively Council Schools. The title of the book, therefore, is somewhat misleading in that its scope is wider than the history of the current Anthony Roper Primary School, and covers all preceding publically run schools in the parishes of Eynsford and Farningham, from their early origins in the eighteenth century. The ten chapters of the book fall into three sections - Farningham, Eynsford and Anthony Roper School, and each is covered chronologically. This means that the book can be read cover to cover, or one can turn first to either village or the present school depending on where the reader's main interest lies.

Diana has successfully blended the broad approach, interspersed with more detailed incidents which bring the story more vividly alive. In 1868 Harry Skinner died of rabies seven weeks after a dog had bitten him on the way to school; in 1908 the infants room in Farningham was rendered unusable because of the snow driven into it; on 3 July 1944 Farningham school children spent all day in the school air raid shelter to avoid flying bombs; in 1988 teachers had the problem of distinguishing between one set of triplets and three sets of twins!

The book is well illustrated, and more so into the modern era when photography and colour became more common. Anyone with an interest in the history of the villages of Eynsford and Farningham would find much to fascinate them.

Farningham against Hitler by Bernard drew (1946)

Knowing that the Society is opening the Autumn session with a talk on Doodlebugs in the Darent Valley, I thought I would look into this booklet to see the number of flying bombs that hit Farningham. The answer is six VIs and one V2. It is interesting that Bernard refers to them as fly-bombs.

ARP records show that Eynsford suffered 10 flying bombs explosions, two of which resulted from the flying bombs getting caught up with barrage balloon cables. The Darent Valley had a concentration of barrage balloons set up to try to intercept the flying bombs before they reached London, and the strategy seems to have had some measure of success, but at the cost of increasing danger locally.

1412 Murder in Farningham

William Wickhurst, the younger, was indicted on 25 April 1412 for striking Robert Sacry, the Archbishop of Canterbury's bailiff, with a stick on the head to the brain and so killed him. *Henry V, Calendar of Patent Rolls, 27 June 1413*

(Isaac) Leslie Hore-Belisha after Eynsford

From 1938 Leslie Hore-Belisha became a house guest of Mrs Elizabeth Elliott at Hull Place, Sholden, because of anti-Jewish elements in London. He served as Secretary of State for War, 1937–1940, so could have been the target of pro-Nazi sympathisers. He lived secretly in Kent and took charge of the running of the house when not in London on parliamentary business. Mrs Elliott's daughter, Cynthia, was in France helping to run a mobile canteen at the time, but the rapid advance of the German army led to her being taken as a prisoner-ofwar. She spent three years in captivity before she was released in 1943. Having reached breaking point in the internment camp she vowed never to go back to a life of ease and luxury which she had enjoyed as a socialite before the war. To everyone's surprise on 22 June 1944 she married Leslie Hore-Belisha - he a confirmed bachelor aged 51, and she a dynamic 28 year-old. She supported her husband's political career which reached a pinnacle when he became 1st Baron Hore-Belisha in 1954. The marriage ended with his death in 1957, aged 63, but he and his wife were already leading separate lives. He left his estate to his secretary, Miss Sloane. Cynthia soon re-married, and settled in the Virgin Islands with her second husband - and the story has twists from there but read the article to find out more. General Enquiries

Till and Arbor Day - John is hoping to write the subject up for a Gardening Club project. **Army base at Bourne Wood, Stones Cross Road** - Andrius thought rectangular depressions at Marwood were remains of trenches. They are in fact where clay was dug out for bricks made in Stevens Brickfield next to the wood.

The Chronology of Warlock's Songs and J. Peter Hauser - Stuart is building up a collection of these to be deposited in the Bodleian Library. In July 1927 Warlock wrote a song in Eynsford called 'The Lover's Maze' which he dedicated to J. Peter Hauser. Stuart wanted information about Hauser. I suggested he looked up the 1921 census which is now on-line (with subscription). Another reference to Hauser came from *Parlement of Prattlers* (1928) illustrated by Hal Collins, who also had Eynsford connections. Stuart would welcome any information about J. Peter Hauser.

Goldsall Road - Esme had been asked for the derivation of the name. The 1802 Lullingstone Estate Map shows Goldsall Wood roughly in the Swanley station area. The 'gold' element is uncertain, but the 'sall' part comes for the word sall/sel meaning shelving land, which would apply as the land drops away to the east Pinks Hill area.

Eynsford queries from Michael -

Sparepenny Lane - Michael wanted to know how a penny was spared through Sparepenny Lane. This toll gate was used to collect tolls from people using the lane to join the toll road (A225), but local people were charged one penny less, and therefore saved a penny by this route joining the turnpike road in Eynford rather than using the section from Farningham.

Arthur Mee's house - Michael lived in Eynsford from 1948 to 1976. He wanted to know the location of 'Eynsford Hill'. I called at Eynsford Hill recently, but the house appeared to be unoccupied, although there were cars parked outside. The view across the valley from the top of the drive was wonderful.

The weir, Old Mill Close - Rod attended a site meeting of the River Catchment Group at the weir during which the Environment Agency and Thames Water suggested removing the weir to ease the passage for fish. Rod asked for information on Eynsford Paper Mill about which there is large amount at the Centre.

Family History

Richard Smith/ Waghorn - Linda's grandfather was a descendant of Aaron Smith of Crockenhill, whose name has appeared in previous enquiries. I found his baptismal record, his parent's marriage and entries in various censuses, which I sent to her. His father, Richard was an engine driver at Thomas Wood and Sons, and Edward Wood looked up the business records and found that he was employed by the company between 1871 and 1888. A follow-up email from Linda then suggested her grandfather might have been adopted into a Waghorn family, but no Waghorns appeared on the 1891 census.

Pryer - Sheila's maiden name was Pryer and she wanted to look at Pryer family documents in the Centre, which Roger Pryer had deposited with the Society. I sent her a list of Pryer items in the catalogue. She asked for copies of indentures for Park House, Bower Lane, (1835), and of a church court case of 1783 when William Pryer was accused by Revd. Marmaduke Lewis of behaving indecently, irregularly and irreverently, and for chiding or brawling by words in the Vestry at Eynsford Church. Tantalisingly, the indictment did not mention what triggered this outburst, but William agreed to abide in every way by the Court's decision.

We resumed working parties at the Centre in October and made some progress with the backlog accumulated during the Covid pandemic. On the last Monday in October we thoroughly cleaned the interior and our new volunteer, Keith Turner, tackled the hedge which was overhanging the roof. All was ship-shape until the burst pipes reported earlier in this Bulletin. More mould accumulated in both the front and back rooms and the dehumidifier was working non-stop to dry the Centre out. In the meantime Eynsford Parish Council put in an insurance claim for redecoration. We only heard that we could go ahead with a contractor in late May. It is hoped that the redecoration will start in early September. To allow access to the walls all the cupboards will have to be emptied and all artefact boxes and Brian Philp's Riverside excavation boxes will have to be removed. The physical effort and disruption will be immense. There is also the logistical problem of finding alternative storage space at the Centre for the displaced items ... then putting everything back again.


